Chair's Introduction

You will almost certainly be made to feel welcome and appreciated and bring pleasure into someone's life. You may even find a new friend, who knows?

Our **PPG secretary Elspeth Woods** who has organised the Red House '*indoor*' volunteers for the COVID vaccination clinics said "We were delighted to receive the award. The PPG exists to support the practice and patients so stepping in to assist at the vaccination clinics was just instinctive. It has given us all a real sense of achievement during difficult times and we are very proud to be recognised by Hidden Heroes"



New premises?

Sadly, the practice has outgrown its current location both in terms of our patient population and the capacity to accommodate our staff and patient care and support. After discussions with the Clinical Commissioning Group it has become clear the current site can't be upgraded or adapted any further, to meet our needs but funds are available to build a new, purpose built surgery within the new housing scheme at Eaton Leys (just near the Hunter's Farm roundabout). We are aware that there may be some concern about travelling to a new relocated surgery but new facilities are a necessity and should benefit our patients greatly.

Some of you who attended our 'flu clinics will have recognised in the earlier pictures Shona (Ed.), Brian and Judy who were asking some questions about how patients had travelled to the surgery and what they thought about a possible move of the Red House to a new location. This wasn't a scientific study but an opportunity taken just to gauge patient feelings. More formal and wider consultation is planned. The PPG will be assisting the surgery in all consultations about the proposed move and if you have any questions then please email us.







Spectacles

The surgery has been collecting unwanted spectacles for the **Lions Club of GB** who send them to 3rd world countries for those less fortunate. The lenses can be adapted to fit a variety of prescriptions and as a long time wearer of glasses I know what a precious gift they can be.
