Overall, one man in every 8 gets prostate cancer (but it's one in 4 for Black men).

If your father or brother has been diagnosed with prostate cancer your risk of having the disease is more than doubled.

144 men a day are diagnosed.

Latest data shows more than 12,000 men died of prostate cancer in one year. Most of them died because their cancer was not detected early enough.

490,000 men are living with or after prostate cancer.
